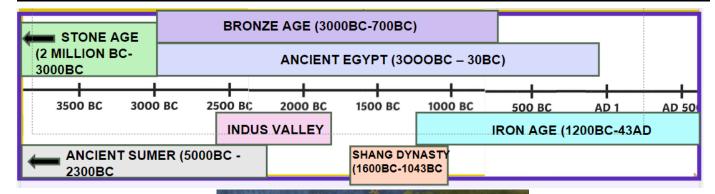

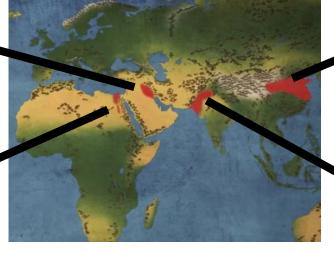
- That prehistory is time before written records

Vocabulary

Civilisation—a large group of people who share ways of living and working with culture and government

Cradle of Civilisation—a place where an ancient civilisation first began and grew

Ancient Sumer—civilisation in Mesopotamia

Mesopotamia—modern day Iraq

Indus Valley—civilisation in modern day Pakistan, India and Afghanistan

Shang Dynasty—civilisation in modern day China

Astrology—study of the stars and planets

Cuneiform—Ancient Sumerian writing

Hieroglyphics—Ancient Egyptian writing

Irrigation—rerouting water from a river to farms

Architecture—building

Archaeologist—historian who digs for artefacts and studies the past

Government—the leaders of a civilisation. Most important people are at the top, the people lower down support the more important people.

Oracle bones—writing carved on animal bones used to speak to the Gods

Diviner—a religious leader in the Shang Dynasty
